

**Minutes of the FIL General Assembly
7th and 8th July 2014
Marriot Renaissance, Denver, Colorado**

GA Day 1 July 7, 2014

Meeting called to order at 9:18 am

1. President's Opening Remarks –Stan Cockerton

Stan Cockerton (SC) welcomed all delegates, observers and guests. (For attendance list see Appendix 1.)

SC reviewed the membership changes since the last GA, new Associate Members being Colombia, Singapore, Jamaica, Estonia and the Philippines. Israel and Thailand had moved to being Full Members.

The Delegates and Observers introduced themselves.

SC reviewed the outline of meeting agenda, arrangements / logistics for the next 2 days.

SC thanked the past FIL event host countries and USA for hosting the current event.

SC asked if the GA would be willing to waive the 60-day and 30-day period to vote Malaysia as the newest member and Germany proposal.

Acceptance of the budget was proposed by England, seconded by Australia
Carried unanimously

RB advised that that Olympic inclusion program would need a budget of at least \$2m.

RB proposed Joe Sciacca be appointed as the auditor for the next two years – Carried

5. Development Report- Tom Hayes

Tom Hayes (TH) began his report with the showing of a film about Kenya Lacrosse. Then he and Rob Mercurio (Development Board) handed out new member certificates.

TH then went on to discuss Olympic dream for the FIL with the help of every member country identifying the top donors within their country. TH said that lacrosse be in the Olympics the mind-set in is now “when”. This shows the progression of the FIL on the international stage.

TH referred to the Development Report that had been copied out to members.

6. Men’s Sector Report- Jack Emmer

Jack Emmer (JE) introduced the Men’s Sector Committee Chairs in attendance:
Terry Harding, Rules Chair.
Don Blacklock, Officiating Chair.
Ron Balls, Competitions Chair.

JE reviewed the concussion policy that was put into place for the 2014 World Championship for the purposes of US Lacrosse’s Insurance.

7. Elections for Vice President, Finance Director, Men’s Director

Each candidate spoke for 2-3 minutes about themselves while other candidates were out of the room. A ballot was undertaken with Scotland and Ireland acting as vote counters. The results with 25 total voters were:

Women's World Event Bylaws

The Women's World Event Bylaws to be approved in its entirety with the following clauses to be voted upon separately:.

16- 0- 0 **Carried**

1.4.1

A country must be a member of the FIL for at least two years prior to participating in a world event (from date of commencement of the event). A full member country is eligible to compete for the championship trophy. An associate member can participate in the event; however, will not be eligible to play in the medal play-off rounds.

11- 5- 0 **Carried**

1.7

It is the responsibility of each country wishing to compete to complete the Acceptance form and Country Contact form within 2 months from the invitation being sent to the FIL Women's Competitions Chair. After receiving these forms, an invoice will be issued for 50% of the entry fee which will be due 30 days from date of invoice. The entry fee must be paid as per the invoice instructions. A second invoice for the remaining 50% will be issued, due by 31 December in the year prior to the event.

1.12.1

It is the countries' responsibility to electronically submit all forms (Registration, Proof of Eligibility, Medical Treatment Authority, and Code of Conduct) no later than 1 March of the year of the event. If U19, the forms must also be signed by the parent/guardian.

It is the countries' responsibility to electronically submit all staff forms (Staff Registration & Code of Conduct) no later than 1 March of the 3 months prior year prior to the commencement of the event (to the first Managers meeting at the world event). If U19, the forms must also be signed by the parent/guardian.

A team may consist of a maximum of 18 players once the event begins. A team may bring up to 2 additional players to train with the team prior to managers' meeting where the final roster is confirmed. The 2 additional players may remain with the team for the duration of the event and may participate in practices held on practice fields after the commencement of the event, but may not participate in any activities on the main game fields including opening and closing ceremonies.

All uniforms must be in line with requirements in FIL rules and include the FIL patch which is to be located on the right or left thigh of the skirt/shorts. Non-compliance = 10 units.

Medical staff: The first (pre-event) Medical meeting is to be scheduled one day prior to the first game of the event. Each team is to be represented, preferably, and at a minimum, by the Athletic Trainer (or equivalent). The meeting shall be co- chaired by the FIL Chair of Competition and event Medical Director. It is the responsibility of the host country to schedule day, time and venue for meeting and advise accordingly. This meeting must be held separately with the Coaches and/or Manager's meeting.

Non-compliance = 3 units.

Medical staff: At least one more 'in event' Medical meeting is to be scheduled during the competition. Each team is to be represented, preferably, and at a minimum, by the Athletic Trainer (or equivalent). The meeting shall be chaired by the event Medical Director. It is the responsibility of the host country to schedule day, time and venue for meeting and advise accordingly. Non-compliance = 3 units.

The host country will arrange and pay for transportation from arrival point in country (e.g. airport, train station, bus station) to event residence and will assist in arranging for transportation from residence to departure point (if leaving immediately following the Championship) for:

- Official Party/Official Party

- Score table personnel including announcers if coming from outside host city

The cost of VIP's/Past FIL Board/IFWLA Presidents/FIL Lifetime Achievers/IFWLA Life Members/FIL Board transportation will be borne by FIL.

A FIL World Team will be selected from competing teams. A selection panel will be established by FIL in consultation with the host country. Coaches and match award judges (if relevant) to be included in the selection panel with feedback sought from Team Coaches. The team to comprise one goal keeper, 3 defense, 5 midfield and 3 attack. The type and cost of the awards will be borne by FIL. These awards shall be presented at a time determined by the FIL Women's Competition Chair and the Event Coordinator.

These awards shall be presented to recognize an outstanding contribution by an individual/group to the team/group selecting them. One award will be presented by each participating team, by the umpires/TDs and by the FIL Women's Sector. Nominations will be compiled by the FIL Competitions Chair. These awards shall be presented at a time determined by the FIL Women's Competition Chair and the Event Coordinator.

U19 World Events ONLY 2.5.1 Students who attend school in a country other than their home country may apply for a School Waiver from the FIL Board to be able to represent the country in which they attend school. The decision to represent this nation is binding for all future U19 events. Criteria to be considered in granting a waiver includes, but is not limited to: endorsement from home country and length of time of attendance at school. (See Appendix U19 School Waiver form)

2.5.2 A player applying for this waiver must choose which national governing body (country) they may represent prior to team trials/selection. Once a waiver is granted, it is binding for all U19 representation.

2.5.3 A player who receives a School Waiver as outlined in 2.5.1 must apply for an ITC in order to participate for their home country at a World Cup.

Any player (national or non-passport holder) who has previously participated in a FIL world event, who meets all eligibility requirements as per 2.1.1 and 2.1.2, and wants to represent another country.

Any player (national or non-passport holder) who has represented one country in a recognized FIL Event and who elects to represent a different country, must wait a minimum of three (3) years from the end of the event where she last represented her former country.

A player who has dual citizenship (2.4) and has represented one country in a FIL World Event must have an approved ITC in order to compete for the other nationality. A player may switch national eligibility only once.

9. Olympic Recognition- Ron Balls

RB commented on the documentation that is required to be submitted as part of the Olympic recognition process which includes the following:

Anti-Corruption, Athletes Commission, Board Code of Conduct, Code of Conduct Betting Integrity, Code of Ethics, Entourage Guidelines, Olympic Value Add, Sport for All and Development Commission, and outlined the full IOC requirements and the timescales. Acceptance of the documents (all) was proposed by JPN seconded by USA

44.1: Time-Outs

44.5 A team may request a time-out provided:

- i. The ball is dead; or
- ii. The team requesting the time-out has player possession of the ball in its attack half of the field.

AR 44.1 Deleted, 2014 FIL General Assembly, Denver, Colorado.

This AR provided the specific example of a ball in flight and traveling across the centerline of the field and providing rulings as to when the time-out request was legal or illegal. There is no need for this AR now as there must be player possession for a time-out to be requested.

34.9: Facing At The Center

Amend Rule 34.9 with respect to where the players may be on a center face-off when a team has player(s) off serving penalty time.

34.9 At the time of a center face-off, when a team has 1 or more players out of the game on penalty, that team shall confine the goalkeeper and three (3) players in its defense goal area, and 3 players in its attack goal area. Exception: When a team has three (3) or more players in the penalty area, a player may come out of his defense goal area to take the face-off, but he must obey the offside rule.

65.1: Off-sides

Amend Rule 65 so that offside is defined as a team may have no more than 6 players, including those players off serving penalty time, in their offensive half and no more than 7 players in the defensive half, including those off serving penalty time. The effect is that the offside rule on a practical level is not changed but the wording to describe offside is changed to more directly describe when a team is offside. In this proposal the team is offside when they are playing in the defensive half with more players than they should or playing in the offensive half with more players than they should.

Rule 65 Offside

65.1 Provided that the ball is in play, a team is offside when:

- i. It has more than six (6) men including players in the penalty box in its attack half of the field, between the centerline and the end line; or
- ii. It has more than seven (7) men including players in the penalty box in its defensive half of the field, between the centerline and the end line.

Section 1: Unified Field

Changes to Section 1, Re unified field dimensions

The FIL General Assembly, in 2012, approved the FIL unified field as the official FIL lacrosse field. With the approval of that field in 2012 there is a need to alter Section 1, The Playing Field, so that the rulebook description of the field of play is consistent with the 2012 approved unified lacrosse field.

Section 1 The Playing Field

Amend Section 1; Rule 31.2; AR 31.1; Rule 34.2; AR 34.18; Rule 35.1; Rule 37; and provide Appendix B, a drawing of the field of play, and Appendix C, a drawing of the bench area. Section 1 is being amended so that the text of the rulebook aligns with the new FIL unified lacrosse field, which was approved at the 2012 General Assembly.

Men's Indoor Rules

The Indoor Rules had been agreed in by postal vote in 2013 and would be update with diagrams and photographs prior to WILC2015.

Women's Rules

That the following rules for 2015-2018 be voted on collectively:

13- 2- 0 Carried

Rule 10.H p.30

Each team may request two 90 second time outs during regulation play and one time out during overtime. Time outs not used during regulation play are not permitted during overtime. A team may request a time out after a goal is scored or when a team has possession of a 'dead ball' anywhere on the field outside the 15m fan. The coach may request the time out through the score table or the player who is given possession of the ball may request the time out directly to through a field umpire.

12- 1- 3 Carried

12.A.2: To draw, the ball is placed between the crosses in the upper one-half of the head near the widest part of the heads.

Rule 22D Green card

D. Penalties for Delay of Game and other Persistent Minor Fouls.

1. The first time an umpire awards a card for delay of game or persistent minor fouls, the umpire will show the team's captain a green card, and award the appropriate minor foul free position, if applicable, at the spot of the ball.
2. For the second delay of game or persistent minor foul penalty, the umpire will show the offending player a yellow card and award a major foul penalty. The offending player must leave the field for a minutes timed penalty and her team must play with 1 less player below/goal side of the restraining lines for the duration of the 2 minutes penalty.

3. Deleted including a. b. c. inclusive

11- 5- 0 Carried

Rule 17.C.1 Goal circle foul

With two exceptions below, when the defense commits any goal circle foul, the attack will be awarded a major foul free position at the 11m mark on the goal line extended that is nearest to the foul. Unless it is the goalkeeper, the defender who fouled will move 4m behind where the 15 m fan intersects the goal line.

Exceptions to the rule would be:

The Goalkeeper (she would not go behind and would abide by goal circle penalties in Rule 17.C1.a.)

An illegal deputy (penalized for a major foul, Rule 17.C.1.b.)

11- 5- 0 Carried

Rule:

The reserve table official may call a Time Out to consult with the umpires to correct procedure for a player who receives a warning card.

The reserve table official may award a warning card for misconduct by a team coach, manager, or other team personnel.

14- 1- 1 Carried

Rule 19.3 – Move to 20 (major foul)

A player must not guard her crosse with her arm. If one hand is removed from the shaft of the crosse, an elbow or free arm may not be used to ward off an opponent deliberately or otherwise, with or without contact.

14- 2- 0 Carried

Rule 19.6

A player who scores a goal must immediately drop her stick to allow the umpire to confirm it is legal. A player must not adjust the thongs of her crosse after an umpire requests to inspect her crosse.

13- 4- 0 Carried

Motion to wave 60-day notice.

11- 2- 2 Carried

Rule 24.E

Remove word recommendation from Differential Formula.

14- 1- 0 Carried

Rule 24.K

The scoreline for a forfeit is 12-0 (maximum goal differential)

13- 1- 2 Carried

Elected to not present

19.15 A team must not request for a third time during a game, or any other additional times, the inspection of an opponent's crosse when it meets specifications. A free position will be awarded at the spot of the ball or where play was to resume before the crosse was checked.

4. World Championships Competition 2022- Ron Balls

RB presented several slides concerning the 2022 Men's World Championship. RB considered that 2018 would probably be the last of the all- inclusive men's senior World Championships.

The concerns relate to the size of the event and the ability of a host to cope with the growing number of teams. FIL needs to determine the format for future. RB would engage with a number of members to develop proposals to be considered at the 2016 General Assembly.

In current world events all full and associate members can play but associates cannot progress through to the medal rounds. This is only considered internally.

5. WADA Presentation- Feffie Barnhill

FB advised the GA that the revised draft Bylaws covering Anti-Doping were not ready to present at this time as changes had been requested by WADA on the document sent to them. FB advised that the Anti-Doping Bylaws would be sent out for a postal vote..

6. Post 2018 Officiating / Hosting presentation- Ron Balls

RB covered three main points:

- 1) Women's Event hosts paying officials accommodation and food costs whereas this is a team shared cost for men
- 2) For Men's events the travel costs are covered by the individuals or their NGB and for women this is a shared team cost
- 3) The geographic differences in costs

The presentation covered some of the options and member feedback / input was sought.

7. International World Games 2015- Shelley Maher

SM advised that the International World Games Association (IWGA) competition proposal was for:

- 6 women's teams – (that would be top 5 teams + Poland)
- 107 participants (15 players, 1 coach and 1 official per team plus support)
- 4 day event, no dates finalized

Discussion covered the need to participate, to look at possible options, consider age group teams etc.

8. Women's Officiating- Shelley Maher

Women propose adding the FIFA run test as a 3rd fitness test for officials (is passed, can be used at 2015 U19 Women's World Championship).

Motion for FIFA run test for officials- Australia/ Ireland

15-0-1 Carried

9. Strategic Plan- Shelley Maher, Stan Cockerton

SM reviewed the FIL Strategic Plan from 2011-14 and brought up points about voting, board and engagement of members. SM acknowledged the lack of diversity on the FIL board and that there should be consideration for putting together a safety committee and should continue to try to find a major sponsor for the organization. SC talked through the 2015-18 Strategic Plan.

Motion for new strategic plan- Canada/ Australia

10. New Business: Malaysia vote, Germany Motion

Membership

SC asked the meeting to waive the 30-day period to vote Malaysia in as a member

Germany

Germany presented their case about the non-inclusion in the 2014 World Championships Blue Division. Once it was decided that Germany was not in the Blue Division for 2014 they advised that they had suffered a loss in excess of \$20,000 through lost sponsorships/ equipment deals.

Motion from Germany:

Amendment to FIL Constitution

Section 11 – Dispute Resolution / CAS:

11.3 The executive board of the FIL can determine that in the event that a member organization is caused to suffer the loss of financial support due to an FIL decision that inadvertently results in such loss, the FIL can submit to the membership for vote the waiver of participation fee for a member country for up to two full cycles of championship events. (a full cycle is defined as men's, women's, seniors & U19 and indoor)

Scotland, supported by 6 other members, requested a ballot

Carried

Motion for the Constitution change- Australia/ Ireland

18-0-0 Carried

SC asks the GA to vote on the proposal of motion to be applied to Germany in relation to WC2014 for two full cycles -Australia/Canada

18-0-0 Carried

11. Board structure-Ron Balls

RB introduced the discussion by stating that the current board structure had been in place since 2008 and with the unification of the men’s and women’s federations. RB advised of points to consider including: number of people on the board, skills, “appointed” members, rather than elected), gender diversity and possibly additional members to assist with the Olympic Vision team. RB asked the GA to help the board by providing feedback and comments to himself or SC to help to determine the changes that need to be made to best reflect the needs moving forward.

12. Mobile Game- Feffie Barnhill

FB began the presentation with a short video depicting the animation of a basketball game that will look similar to the lacrosse game. FB offered the view that the men’s field game would be the best way to go for the federation because it has the best display for the FIL. FB went on to talk about the opportunities for both members and individual players to have contracts with the mobile game to be able to make money.

The USA expressed concerns about pre-existing individual apparel and gear contracts, as well as country sponsorships and how they would conflict. FB asked that each member consider their participation in the mobile game and encouraged delegates to meet Patrick Braid, the game creator, while he is at the World Championship to continue the conversation.

13. Website- Feffie Barnhill

- Adding and updating contacts
- Julia will be sending out access passwords for nation’s account
- All slide packs presented at the GA to be placed on the FIL web site.

14. Closing Remarks- Stan Cockerton

SC said he had good feelings about the GA. He wished the best of luck to the teams in the World Championships. He also wished all countries the best with their development programs. He said that grassroots development is the key to success. He wished Delegates and Observers safe travel home and said he looked forward to seeing everyone in 2016.
